



COMMUNITY BASED INTERNSHIPS - PAID


In 2010, the University YMCA (UY) began to focus on increasing engagement while providing support to underrepresented undergraduate students in a program specifically designed to support, engage and develop their leadership. Through this program, Y Collegiate Achievers (YCAP), students (first generation, racial minorities, and/or from low-income families) who have historically performed and graduated at lower levels compared to non-underrepresented students. The Y believed this model could address these issues using innovative and creative services not currently being offered by the federal and local collegiate retention models.

THE STUDY

- > Out of over 28,000 underrepresented UMN students, 412 students participated in the UY programs in 2010-2015
- > 216 students participating in their first year were matched with *optimal pair propensity score matching* to a group of UMN students who were similar on 15 background characteristics
- > Analyzed differences with grade point average (GPA), graduation rates, and credits completed.







Propensity Scores after Optimal Pair Matching
